Rare Plant Status Review: *Oenothera longissima*Kristi Lazar (CNPS) and Roxanne Bittman (CNDDB) November 28, 2006

Background

Oenothera longissima is a biennial herb in the Onagraceae. This species is known in California from 3 occurrences in Inyo (Deep Springs Valley) and San Bernardino Counties (Keystone Spring and Cornfield Spring). O. longissima is also known outside of California in Arizona, Colorado (S1), Nevada, New Mexico, and Utah. This species occurs in creosote bush scrub and pinyon/juniper woodlands between 1000 meters and 1700 meters in elevation. All known occurrences in California need to be vouchered or re-vouchered as there are no specimens from San Bernardino County and there is only one vouchered specimen from Inyo County which needs updating. The San Bernardino County populations of this species are small and isolated (pers. comm. J. Andre). There are no major threats to the San Bernardino County populations; however, there has been some historic hydrologic alteration (pers. comm. J. Andre). The status of the Inyo County occurrence is not known.

O. longissima is similar in appearance to O. elata ssp. hirsutissima; however, O. longissima has a larger hypanthium (60-135 mm versus 20-48 mm). O. longissima is currently known in California from 3 occurrences in Inyo and San Bernardino Counties and requires review for inclusion in both the CNPS Inventory and the CNDDB.
