Rare Plant Status Review: *Cirsium arizonicum* var. *tenuisectum* Kristi Lazar (CNPS) and Roxanne Bittman (CNDDB) November 20, 2006

Background

Cirsium arizonicum var. tenuisectum is a perennial herb in the Asteraceae. This species is known in California from approximately 3 occurrences in the New York Mountains of eastern San Bernardino County. This species is also known from the Spring Mountains in Nevada. The name Cirsium nidulum has long been misapplied to this species. In SIDA 21 (1): 207-219 (2004) and in the Flora of North America treatment, David Keil classifies C. nidulum as a synonym of C. arizonicum var. arizonicum with the exception of the New York Mountains, CA and Spring Mountains, NV populations of C. nidulum which he has classified as the distinct taxon, C. arizonicum var. tenuisectum.

C. arizonicum var. *tenuisectum* occurs in rocky slopes, canyons, and roadsides in pine-oak-juniper woodlands between 1500 meters and 2800 meters in elevation. The *Flora of North America* mentions that this taxon is of conservation concern. The range of *C. arizonicum* var. *tenuisectum* overlaps with *C. eatonii* var. *clokeyi* in Nevada; however, no hybrids are known. *C. arizonicum* var. *tenuisectum* is currently known in California from 3 occurrences and requires review for inclusion in both the CNPS Inventory and the CNDDB.
