Rare Plant Status Review: *Hedeoma drummondii*Kristi Lazar (CNPS) and Roxanne Bittman (CNDDB) November 20, 2006

Background

Hedeoma drummondii is a perennial herb in the Lamiaceae. This species is known in California from 1 occurrence in the New York Mountains of eastern San Bernardino County (Keystone Canyon). This occurrence is comprised of 2 sites with less than 20 individuals each and separated by approximately 200 meters. The 2 sites appear to have different ecology with one in the open sun growing on a rocky substrate while the other site is in filtered light and gravelly soils. Outside of California, this species is fairly widespread as it occurs in 18 states (including California) and extends as far east as Alabama. The only western states that this species is not known to occur in are Idaho, Oregon, and Washington. While there are no known threats to this species, the fact that this is the only known occurrence with less than 40 plants in total makes it extremely vulnerable to extirpation due to the threat of any catastrophic natural event (disease, fire, herbivory, etc.)

In California, *H. drummondii* occurs in rocky, gravelly soils in pinyon and juniper woodlands and Great Basin scrub between 1400 meters and 1700 meters in elevation. *H. drummondii* is currently known in California from 1 occurrence in San Bernardino County and requires review for inclusion in both the CNPS Inventory and the CNDDB.
